SPEAKER



Denis McBride is a Redemptorist priest from Scotland who is now Director of *Redemptorist Publications*. In his post-graduate education, he first studied psychology at Fordham University and then the New Testament under the great scripture scholar Raymond Brown at Union Theological Seminary in New York. After winning a scholarship to Harvard University, he returned to England to work at Hawkstone Hall, the international pastoral centre in Shropshire. Since then, his areas of interest and writing have been the human story and the Gospels. His work has always struggled to keep open a conversation between the drama of people's lives and the four great narratives of Christian beginning. He has lectured in parish halls, colleges and universities to a variety of groups, including bishops' conferences in North America, Africa, Asia, Australia, New Zealand, and throughout Europe. He has written 14 books and produced 56 CDs.
